Employee Assistance Programs:

Red Cross:

I AM ABLE TO DONATE RESOURCES

United Way:

The Capital Area United Way is accepting donations at its office, 700 Laurel St., from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. daily until further notice. Items in need include: Pillows, blankets, bottled water, underwear for adults and children, cleaning supplies, baby formula and food, masks, nonperishable food items, buckets, mops, rubber gloves, toilet paper, diapers, soap, shampoo, socks for adults and children, feminine hygiene products, deodorant, boxes or containers, and school supplies.

St. Vincent de Paul:

WE NEED TWIN SIZED BLANKETS, SHEETS AND PILLOWS. Can you help us? We will accept donations beginning Monday at the shelter located at 1623 Convention Street. You can drop off donations from 8:30 AM until 4:30 PM.

Salvation Army:

The Salvation Army is accepting donations at Cortana Mall for those in need following the severe weather and flooding in the state. The shelter is accepting toiletries, water, and monetary donations at the mall beginning at noon on Tuesday. Donation items will be loaded onto a truck and taken directly to the impacted areas. Other donation items that will be accepted are toothbrushes, toothpaste, toilet paper, soap, shampoo, and cleaning supplies can all be dropped off at the location. Salvation Army asks that diapers and used clothing or not dropped off at this time.

Shelters:

- There is still a need at Lamar Dixon for volunteers, as well as pillows, blankets, towels, clothes, underwear (new in package), Ziplock bags, socks (all sizes, infants to adults), aloe lotion, baby items (wipes, snacks, bottles, pacifiers, formula, nursery water, diapers of all sizes, pull-ups, baby shampoo, powder, lotion and Mylicon drops), dog food (canned or dry), ropes and buckets for horses, horse food and adult

diapers. Bring items to the gym at Lamar Dixon Expo Center, 9039 St. Landry Road, Gonzales.

- The Baton Rouge River Center shelter is also requesting pillows, blankets, new children's clothing and new socks/underwear
- Celtic Studios- They are in need of lots of bananas it's easy for kids to eat and adults, buying packs of underwear for adults and kids, feminine products, dog leashes and dog food, phone chargers, pillows, + Bathrooms needed to be cleaned. Clorox. Mops, gloves, etc.
- Bethany Church, 11107 Honore Lane, Baton Rouge. Accepting donations of food and personal hygiene items. They providing clothing, food and shelter.

**Most shelters listed below are looking for the same items as above. Please feel free to visit a shelter and ask them for a list of their needs.

Medical Needs Shelter:

- A Medical Special Needs Shelter is open at the LSU Fieldhouse. The Medical Special Needs Shelter does not provide emergency services, but is instead a shelter for those who have chronic medical conditions and particular special needs that cannot be accommodated in a general-population shelter. The Medical Special Needs Shelter will not be available to the general public, but only to those with special medical needs.

Pets:

Companion Animal Alliance, Baton Rouge's city animal shelter

Status: "The animals here at CAA are safe and sound," reads a recent Facebook update, "but many owners and pets have been displaced. Our shelter took in 90 evacuee animals and are expecting more."

Where: 2680 Progress Road, Baton Rouge, LA 70807

What they need: Leashes, pet treats, pet food, dog toys, cash donations, temporary fosters until transportation is available Wednesday, Aug. 17

How to help: Donations can be made in person or [online by clicking here](#). Donations can also be mailed directly to the shelter.

Tangi Humane Society, a privately run shelter

Status: Flooded. The shelter's GoFundMe page gives this update: "The shelter was consumed by fast rising river water, and we had to evacuate all of the animals. Tangi operates on a donation-only basis, and needless to say, they have lost everything."

Where: 46219 River Road, Hammond

What they need: Supplies and a place to temporarily store them, plus bottled water, bleach, shovels, large trash bags, Shop Vacs, blowers and rubber gloves.

How to help: Donations can be made through its [website](#), a [GoFundMe account](#) or directly via PayPal by using the email tangihuman@gmail.com. The society

also has [an Amazon Wish List](#). By making purchases on Amazon, needed items will be sent directly to the shelter.

Denham Springs Animal Shelter

Status: Flooded. The shelter's GoFundMe page gives this update: "The dedicated staff and volunteers fought to save as many animals as possible from the flood waters, eventually having to unlatch the kennel doors and let the dogs swim out and climb onto the roof. The rescue efforts saved many animals, but the shelter is in need of rebuilding and repairs after the flood waters recede. The cattery is totally demolished, and the kennel area and office space are severely damaged."

What they need: A dry, safe place to store supplies, fosters and supplies.

How to help: Those looking to foster a Denham Springs pet can fill out an application through [Animal Rescue New Orleans by clicking here](#). Donations can also be made via the [GoFundMe account](#), which PetCo is matching dollar-for-dollar up to \$50,000. The shelter also has [an Amazon Wish List](#). By making purchases on Amazon, needed items will be sent directly to the shelter.

Lamar Dixon Expo Center, temporary shelter

Status: Being used as a shelter for animals and people.

What they need: Volunteers, hay, buckets, brooms, cleaning supplies, cat litter, plastic litter boxes, pet food for dogs, cats and horses.

How to help: Drop off donations to be delivered there at 921 Rue La Cannes Drive, Luling, from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Donations can also be hand-delivered.

Zeus' Place

Status: Housing more than 60 pets that were evacuated from flooded shelters

What they need: Cat carriers, clay litter, square litter boxes, canned cat and kitten food. Also, fosters or adoptive pet parents.

How to help: Drop those items at 4601 Freret St., New Orleans, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Louisiana Bobcat Refuge

Status: Flooded. The center, which is located in Eunice, didn't lose any rescued animals, but water inundated the entire facility. [See photos of the damage by clicking here](#).

What they need: Cash donations to replace damaged items, plus construction items to rebuild.

How to help: Donate online through the [Refuge's GoFundMe page](#). You can also order items directly through the center's [Amazon Wish List](#).

Jefferson Parish Animal Shelter

Status: Serving as a back-up site for the LASPCA to manage the number of animals affected by flooding.

What they need: Leashes, pet treats, pet food, dog toys, cash donations, temporary fosters.

How to help: Donate [online](#). Items can also be mailed directly.

Where: Jefferson Parish Animal Shelter, 1869 Ames Blvd., Marrero, LA 70072

Livingston SPCA

Status: At least 75 percent of pet foster homes, supplies and medicine have been flooded.

What they need: Donations and foster parents.

How to help: [Donate online](#) or go to the PetCo at 1653 Millerville Road, Baton Rouge, on Saturday, Aug. 20, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. to donate or sign up as a pet foster parent.

IF YOU NEED HELP

FEMA:

If you live in the following parishes, you are now eligible for FEMA assistance: Acadia, Ascension, East Baton Rouge, East Feliciana, Iberia, Lafayette, Livingston, Pointe Coupee, St. Helena, St. Landry, Tangipahoa and Vermillion.

The following are some tips for navigating FEMA assistance from our Senior Vice President, Camille Manning-Broome, a former FEMA employee who worked on long-term recovery in the wakes of hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

If you have flood damage, you should file a claim, whether you have flood insurance or not. You may be eligible for some assistance even if you have flood insurance. You should also file a claim regardless of whether you are or are not in a floodplain. You should apply if you had any damage. The process does not take a lot of time and at least you get into the queue to understand what monies may be available to you.

The more claims FEMA receives, the more informed they are about the extent of the damage.

The FEMA number is 1-800-621-FEMA and claims can be filed at <https://www.disasterassistance.gov/>. Click here to see the assistance, grants, and loans that FEMA provides for flood victims.

When people apply, make sure that they are very clear that they are not living at home now. If they are with friends and family then FEMA may not give rental assistance right away, whereas if they are in a hotel or other rental housing, they may be able to get rental assistance right away.

Individuals who do not have flood insurance and need a loan for renovations can apply for Individual Assistance (IA) and get low-interest loans through SBA."

Next steps:

Here is the process that you can't find on-line.

After you fill out your online application, you will receive an email telling you that an inspection is required but it is vague (you will receive this shortly after you submit your application).

After registering an inspection will occur. FEMA sends an inspector to your property to inspect it and verify damages, prove occupancy (driver's license, utility bill), and prove ownership (title, or insurance), car damages (proof of liability insurance for your car, title and registration will be good to have on hand). Pictures of the damage should be taken prior to doing any work, if possible.

Inspectors work neighborhoods and if the rest of the neighborhood is in similar condition, they will take that into account. If you apply for a low interest loan through the SBA, they will send their own inspectors. Keep pictures and receipts in case they want to look at those too.

State of Louisiana:

Citizens in need of services should dial 211, which is a hotline operating 24/7. Governor's Office 225-342-7015.

DSNAP Food Stamps:

If you do have your homeowner's policy information, call your insurance provider to check on the specifics of your coverage. Also you can inform them that your house is uninhabitable and can request that mortgage payments get deferred (stopped) for the immediate future.

****Tip: Take pictures of ALL damage (inside and outside) before cleaning up.**

Airbnb:

Airbnb owners across the state are offering up their properties for flood victims. Airbnb is also waiving all fees, so it's literally free. I don't know that it is a long-term arrangement (probably depends on the property owner), but it is a fantastic resource for short-term places to stay. Here's the link:

- August 19 – 21 – Approximately 500 – 700 volunteers primarily focused on the Zachary, Baker, Central, Pride, Denham Springs, Walker, Watson, Hammond, Albany
- August 26 – 28 – Approximately 3000 volunteers focused on the above but moving into Baton Rouge, Ascension Parish and Lafayette
- September 2 – 4 – Approximately 2000 volunteers continuing to focus on all areas

Volunteers will be coming in from Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi and Texas. Outside of the relief supplies, this is all that is planned right now but considering the breadth of this, they may extend additional weekends but that will be assessed as clean-up progresses. All will be working off work orders generated through the hotline.
